Peanut Butter

Beanbag No one knows when the first beanbag was invented. However, some historians believe the ancient Egyptians invented it around 2000 BCE These beanbags were probably small, round, made of leather, and filled with beans. The Egyptians may have used them to play different games. Native American tribes also used beanbags to play games, particularly one called beanbag toss. In this game, players take turns tossing a beanbag, trying to get it through a hole cut into a board.

Peanut Butter In 1884, Marcellus Gilmore Edson, a Canadian chemist and pharmacist, patented a way to make peanut paste, an early version of peanut butter. Edson removed the shells from the peanuts. Then he ground them up in a mill used for grinding flour.
